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## NEWS OF THE COLLEGE:

The new College library was completed ahead of schedule. The official opening took place Monday, 13 August. A ceremonial hand carrying of the last few books –from the reference collection– took place during freshman orientation on the first Thursday after the beginning of classes on 23 August. The circular brick plateau between the library and Gilmer Hall is a pleasant addition to this part of the campus. The addition of pole-type streetlights around the circular plateau provides brilliant nighttime lighting for the area.

The Class of 2011 matriculated August 18 with 334 freshmen, purposefully down from last year's 346, but improved retention of upperclassmen gave us an opening enrollment of slightly over 1100 – and again the largest enrollment (by a few students) in the College's history.

Approximately 20 new faculty members joined the College, the largest number of new hires in the College's history. The new faculty were required by a combination of retirements and sabbatical replacements. Five faculty members of long-standing retired at the end of the 2006-2007 academic year: Retiring from the classics department were Professors Brinkley and Tucker; from the English department, Professors Martin and Saunders, and from the mathematics department, Professor Berman.

Sadly, we must report that Professor Lee Cohen lost a long struggle with cancer and died on 16 July. The College's notice of his death reads in part: “Professor of Mathematics Leon McClain Cohen, 44, died at his Hampden-Sydney home on Monday, July 16, 2007, of complications related to pancreatic cancer. Lee was born August 21, 1962, in Covington, Georgia. He earned an undergraduate degree from Emory University in 1983, and, in 1986, a Master's degree in mathematics from the University of Virginia. In that same year, 1986, he began teaching mathematics at Hampden-Sydney College. Over the course of his 21 years at the College, Lee proved to be an excellent and much-revered professor, colleague, and community member. He held numerous key positions at the College, including chair of the Academic Affairs Committee and of the Lectures and Programs Committee; Associate Director and Interim Director of the Honors

Program; and faculty secretary of the Lambda Circle of Omicron Delta Kappa national leadership society. In 2002, he received the Thomas E. Crawley Award for devoted service to the College. He also received numerous teaching awards including the Cabell Award for Distinguished Teaching and the Fuqua Award for Excellence in Teaching. He was specially honored by the graduating classes of 2005 and 2007. Lee served the community at large as a board member of the Esther Thomas Atkinson Museum of Hampden-Sydney, of the Prince Edward Public School Endowment (PEPSE), and of the Farmville Area Community Emergency Services (FACES). He also served as a tutor in the Prince Edward County VICTORS Literacy training program. Memorial donations may be made to Hampden-Sydney College and designated for the Lee McClain Cohen Endowed Math Library Fund.” YKE knows that many AXE alumni have very fond memories of Lee Cohen and his humane, gentle, and caring approach to students as they were mastering mathematics.

Again quoting the College press release: “Mrs. Erlene Bowman, Head Cashier at the Hampden-Sydney College Bookstore, was honored at a retirement party on May 30. Mrs. Bowman has been at Hampden-Sydney for 42 years. For generations of Hampden-Sydney students, Erlene Bowman has been the face of the Bookstore. Through multiple managers and locations, Erlene has been the constant. Her friendly smile and sincere concern for the well being of the thousands of young men with whom she has interacted during Bookstore transactions and the hundreds who have sought her out when they just wanted to talk are long remembered and for many alumni and students represent what they appreciate most about Hampden-Sydney College. “

Also retiring was Mrs. Alice Hines, longtime custodian and friend to all in Gilmer Hall: “Mrs. Alice V. Hines, Custodian at Hampden-Sydney College, was honored at a retirement party on May 30. Mrs. Hines has been with Hampden-Sydney College for 33 years. Mrs. Hines worked primarily in Gilmer and Morton Halls. She is the widow of Sam Hines, who was a long-time employee of the College working in Morton Hall and ringing the class bell.”

Professor of History, Dr. James Simms, was recognized by the College’s Hall of Fame for his contributions to the soccer program. “Dr. Jim Simms founded the Hampden-Sydney soccer program in 1969 and led the team as head coach for 12 years, phasing the team into the Old Dominion Athletic Conference. Simms remains the longest tenured Tiger soccer coach as his 12 years of service is four years longer than any other coach. During that tenure, Simms led the team to 50 victories, including a high water mark of seven wins during the 1976 season. Simms earned his bachelors and masters degrees from the University of Maryland and his doctorate from the University of Michigan. He joined the Hampden-Sydney College faculty in 1968 and has is currently an Elliott Professor of History.”

#### **NEWS OF THE DEPARTMENTS:**

Following the faculty’s approval of a program of departmental and programmatic minors, the science departments have established course requirements for minors in astronomy, biology, and chemistry.

At the spring 2007 awards convocation, Dr. Steve Bloom of the department of physics and astronomy received the John Peter Mettauer Award for excellence in research.

On sabbatical leave last spring, Dr. Edward W. Devlin, Elliot Professor of Biology at Hampden-Sydney College, traveled with a group of faculty from U.S. institutions to participate in the School of International Training (SIT) Study Abroad Access Asia faculty development trip to the Mekong Delta in Viet Nam in June. The trip focused on environmental issues with the faculty studying the natural and cultural ecology of the region. Also in the biology department, Professor Carolina Yaber has accepted a position at James Madison University. Professor Michael D. Collins has joined the biology department faculty. His undergraduate degree is from the College of Wooster and his PhD is from the University of Tennessee

In late February, Professors Anderson and Sipe and four senior chemistry majors – Stephen English, Robbie O’Cain, Mick Robbins, and Kevin Thompson – traveled by air to Chicago for the 2007 Pittsburgh Spectroscopy Conference and Instrument Exhibition. They arrived just in time for a Chicago ice storm that prevented many conferees with later travel schedules from attending the first few days of the meeting. Highly recommended by the group, in addition to the meetings of course, is Chicago deep-dish pizza. Making their way in snow and ice, the group hoofed it through very un-Virginia weather in Chicago to Giordano’s. Professor Paul Mueller is on sabbatical leave during Fall Term 2007 and Professor Dun is scheduled to be on sabbatical leave during Spring Term 2008. In their absences, the department has the able assistance of Dr. Patrick G. Barber, whos has been appointed visiting professor of chemistry. Some of you may remember Dr. Barber from his many years of service at Longwood College before his recent retirement. Dr. Barber did his undergraduate work at Stanford University and his PhD at Cornell University. He also was a postdoctoral fellow at Duke University, and taught for several years at Southside Community College in Keysville before moving to Longwood. He and his wife reside in Keysville. Professor Mueller

is working on a text for the Chemistry and Art course. He is presently writing a chapter on printing, and has been working on his etching and printing techniques as part of it.

Dr. Kevin M. Dunn, Elliott Professor of Chemistry began developing, in 1994, a course which would come to be known as "Caveman Chemistry," in which students follow the history of chemical technology through a series of hands-on projects, from the creation of fire by friction to the synthesis of polyester from automobile anti-freeze.

One line of research to come out of Caveman is in the area of soap chemistry. In recent years a cottage industry has grown up around the production of handcrafted soap. The method used is quite different from that used in the much larger commodity soap industry and consequently the problems faced by handcrafted soap makers have received little attention from academic and industrial chemists. Because one of the chapters in Caveman is on the production of soap, he came to the attention of the Handcrafted Soap Makers Guild, the largest trade organization in handcrafted soap. He has been invited to give lectures on soap chemistry at their annual convention for the past three years.

Professor Dunn has begun writing a book on soap chemistry which he expects to finish during his Spring 2008 sabbatical. He is also expected to appear in a forthcoming episode of the television series, Modern Marvels. Watch for this program about acids on the History Channel.

The chemistry department is having its every-six-years departmental review this fall. (The last review was in 2001 and was interrupted by the September 11, 2001 events.) Some of you may have been asked for feedback earlier in the year.

Of personal note, Professor Herb Sipe traveled to Huntingdon, Pennsylvania in June to attend his Juniata College class 45<sup>th</sup> reunion. Herb supervised one student in summer research: Christopher K. Arnatt '09, was engaged in full-time research for ten weeks with his project titled: "Synthesis of p-hydroxybenzhydylamine and Study of its Phenoxy Radical by Fast-flow ESR Spectroscopy."

Professor William W. Porterfield and his wife, Dorothy, celebrated their 50<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary coincident with the beginning of the new academic year. Among the festivities was a dinner honoring them held by their children and their children's spouses. Also the Porterfields took a trip to the beach analogous to their post-nuptial trip fifty years ago. Although YKE has fewer details, he can also report that Professor Tom Mayo and his wife also recently celebrated their 50<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary.

At the spring 2007 awards convocation, Drew Smith received the H. B. Overcash award given to the outstanding premedical biology major. Justin Azar and Travis Fellows were recipients of the James R. T. Hewitt biology award given to biology majors for promise as biologists and for meritorious service to the biology department. Ben Barnhill was named to receive the Topham Chemistry Award given annually to an outstanding chemistry student. Ryan Newcomb was the

recipient of the Hardy Cross Award in Physics for outstanding achievement in physics. Jon Schaaf received the Department of Psychology award.

Hampden-Sydney junior Andrew McLeod, and Beta Chi brother, has been named to the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District second team. Voted on by members of the College Sports Information Directors of America, McLeod earns the honor in the District 3, College Division at-large team. In the classroom, McLeod maintains a 3.83 GPA average and is double-majoring in Economics and Commerce and Chemistry.

YKE occasionally worries about the academic health of the chapter and seeks objective evidence of the brothers' achievement. Beta Chi chapter had 18 men on the Dean's List (the good one) in fall term 2006 and 16 in spring term 2007. Another measure is the chapter's overall GPA performance. For fall term 2006, 41 brothers had a semester GPA average of 3.155 (ignoring the differing numbers of credit hours taken by different brothers), and eight pledges had a semester GPA average of 3.365. For spring term 2007, the corresponding numbers were: 40 brothers had semester GPA average 3.174 and nine pledges had semester GPA average 3.3548. Some of you may remember the long-standing estimate that pledging a social fraternity costs HSC men from 0.3 to 0.5 GPA unit when they are pledges. A neat statistic is that Alpha Chi Sigma pledges improve their GPAs, based on a comparison of their pledge semester GPA with their cumulative GPA: for the fall 2006 group this was an average increase of 0.14 and for the spring 2007 group it was an average increase of 0.12
